# Lesson 7 - Leading Others to Jesus

## **Understanding Your Purpose**

Do you know what are you here on earth for – your purpose? When you follow Jesus it is something bigger than what you see with your eyes, but at the same time something that is right in front of you.

After his suffering, Jesus spent time with his followers and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God (Acts 1:3, 7-8). Then before Jesus ascended back to heaven, he mapped out for his followers the impact they would have on the world. Once Jesus told them, "If you love me, you will obey my commands." Now three times Jesus asked Peter, "Do you love me?" Peter answered, "Yes, you know that I love you." (John 21).

1. What was implied when Jesus responded to Peter, "feed my lambs, tend my sheep?" What was important to Jesus?

# **Understanding the Task Ahead**

Discovering our purpose in the world is closely tied to understanding Jesus' mission in this world. It was focused on people.

2. Put yourselves for a moment in Jesus' sandals. What did he see when he looked at the people around him?

Matthew 9:35-37 Jesus went through all the towns and villages, teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and healing every disease and sickness. <sup>36</sup> When he saw the crowds, he had compassion on them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd.<sup>37</sup> Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. <sup>38</sup> Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field."

• It is estimated that 4.5+ billion people in the world do not know Christ or do not claim to follow him. Who are those people? What are they like?

Whatever you did for them you did for me

Matthew 25:34-40

• What about the ones near you on a regular basis? Who are they? What do they need?

The term Jesus used to describe his followers.

John 10:1-30 (Psalm 23) Matthew 25:31-33 1 Peter 5:2-4 3. Discuss what you believe happens to those who do not know or follow Christ.

<u>Acts 4:10,12</u> It is by the name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth, whom you crucified but whom God raised from the dead, that this man stands before you healed... <sup>12</sup> Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved."

<u>John 3:16-18</u> For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. <sup>17</sup> For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. <sup>18</sup> Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son.

#### Ascension

Jesus returns to his glory in heaven

John 17:1-5 Acts 1:1-11

#### **The Great Commission**

When Jesus first called Peter, Andrew, James and John (the fishermen), he said, "Come, follow me and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19). Jesus calls us to follow him. Now what?

4. Explain the different dimensions of the mission Jesus gives to his followers. Underline the commands and circle the promises. Then summarize what this means for our mission:

Matthew 28:18-20 Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. <sup>19</sup> Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, <sup>20</sup> and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

<u>Luke 24:45-49</u> Then he opened their minds so they could understand the Scriptures. <sup>46</sup> He told them, "This is what is written: The Messiah will suffer and rise from the dead on the third day, <sup>47</sup> and repentance for the forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem. <sup>48</sup> You are witnesses of these things. <sup>49</sup> I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power."

Acts 1:3, 7-8 After his suffering, he presented himself to them and gave many convincing proofs that he was alive. He appeared to them over a period of forty days and spoke about the kingdom of God...8 But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

<u>1 Peter 2:9,12</u> But you are a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's special possession, that you may declare the praises of him who called you out of darkness into his wonderful light... <sup>12</sup> Live such good lives among the pagans that, though they accuse you of doing wrong, they may see your good deeds and glorify God on the day he visits us.

<u>1 Peter 3:15-16</u> But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect, <sup>16</sup> keeping a clear conscience, so that those who speak maliciously against your good behavior in Christ may be ashamed of their slander.

#### Who me?

When we start looking at the task ahead we revert to Peter's doubts, feelings of inadequacy and fears. Who am I that you would choose me? Realize that God's first announcement of his birth was to shepherds, whom Jewish society didn't highly esteem. His first announcement that he was risen was to the women. And look at those Jesus chose as his close followers to spread his message. They were fishermen, and tax collectors, and zealots – ordinary people who seemed unlikely to lead a movement that hasn't stopped spreading– extending the great kingdom of God worldwide.

5. What do you suppose is God's purpose in working through ordinary people?

<u>Acts 4:13</u> When they saw the courage of Peter and John and realized that they were unschooled, ordinary men, they were astonished and they took note that these men had been with Jesus.

<u>1 Corinthians 1:18-2:5</u> For the message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God... <sup>26</sup> Brothers and sisters, think of what you were when you were called. Not many of you were wise by human standards; not many were influential; not many were of noble birth. <sup>27</sup> But God chose the foolish things of the world to shame the wise; God chose the weak things of the world to shame the strong...

**2** Corinthians 4:5, 7, 13-15 For what we preach is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, and ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake... But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us...

Romans 12:4-6 For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, <sup>5</sup> so in Christ we, though many, form one body, and each member belongs to all the others. <sup>6</sup> We have different gifts, according to the grace given to each of us.

- What "ordinary" persons do you know who exemplify the great things God can accomplish?
- Recall amazing things God has done in your life to reveal his grace, power, and glory.
- Discuss how you fit together like a body to be for others God's hands, feet, ears to carry out HIS mission in this world.

#### The Powerful Resources We Have

We were created for something greater than ourselves. We also rely on someone greater than us: God who has unlimited, unforeseen resources to make happen. Nothing is impossible with God.

6. Describe the powerful tool Jesus has given us and how it further defines our purpose.

Romans 1:1-4, 16-17 Paul, a servant of Christ Jesus, called to be an apostle and set apart for the gospel of God – <sup>2</sup> the gospel he promised beforehand through his prophets in the Holy Scriptures <sup>3</sup> regarding his Son, who as to his earthly life was a descendant of David, <sup>4</sup> and who through the Spirit of holiness was appointed the Son of God in power by his resurrection from the dead: Jesus Christ our Lord... <sup>16</sup> For I am not ashamed of the gospel, because it is the power of God that brings salvation to everyone who believes: first to the Jew, then to the Gentile. <sup>17</sup> For in the gospel the righteousness of God is revealed – a righteousness that is by faith from first to last, just as it is written: "The righteous will live by faith."

Means of Grace The gospel in Word and Sacraments **John 14:25-26; 16:12-13** "All this I have spoken while still with you. <sup>26</sup> But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you all things and will remind you of everything I have said to you... <sup>16:12</sup> "I have much more to say to you, more than you can now bear. <sup>13</sup> But when he, the Spirit of truth, comes, he will guide you into all the truth. He will not speak on his own; he will speak only what he hears, and he will tell you what is yet to come."

**2 Timothy 3:13-17** But as for you, continue in what you have learned and have become convinced of, because you know those from whom you learned it, <sup>15</sup> and how from infancy you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. <sup>16</sup> All Scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, <sup>17</sup> so that the servant of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.

The Word is like a seed planted in hearts Matthew 13:1-12, 18-23

Jesus told his followers: "What I tell you in the dark, speak in the daylight; what is whispered in your ear, proclaim from the roofs. <sup>28</sup> Do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul. Rather, be afraid of the One who can destroy both soul and body in hell. <sup>29</sup> Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground outside your Father's care. <sup>30</sup> And even the very hairs of your head are all numbered. <sup>31</sup> So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows. <sup>32</sup> "Whoever acknowledges me before others, I will also acknowledge before my Father in heaven. (Matthew 10:26-31).

At the Pentecost festival, Jesus sent the Holy Spirit as promised. The disciples' hearts became consumed with making the grace and glory of God known in the person of Jesus for all nations. Peter, who had previously crumbled under pressure and denied even knowing Jesus, now stood up against those who

would silence them. "Judge for yourselves whether it is right in God's sight to obey you rather than God. For we cannot help speaking about what we have seen and heard" (Acts 4:19-20). He confidently told those who opposed them that "Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). The impact of their message became obvious. The small seed of the gospel was scattered and spread throughout the world – not a new system of religion but a relationship with Jesus who was the fulfillment of everything we need before God...everything we need for life...is Life itself. Christian churches

Finding the Hidden Treasure Matthew 13:44-46 6:19-21,33

rose up in Africa, in France, in India and China. All the disciples except John were stoned, beaten to death, or crucified for their faith – a treasure so important and valuable to them that they would give up all to have it. Their eyes were on what is unseen – their relationship with God through Christ and their treasure in heaven that is there because of him.

- 7. Evaluate why there is frequently no sense of urgency today for this task/command of Jesus.
- 8. What can we (you) do about it?
